About IGNOU

The Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU), established by an Act of Parliament in 1985, has continuously striven to build an inclusive knowledge society through inclusive education. It has tried to increase the Gross Enrollment Ratio (GER) by offering high-quality teaching through the Open and Distance Learning (ODL) mode.

Today, it serves the educational aspirations of over 3 million students in India and other countries through 21 Schools of Studies and a network of 67 Regional Centres, around 2,000 Learner Support Centres and 20 overseas institutions. All the regional centres and high enrollment Learners Support have been provided with active two-way video-conferencing network connectivity, which has made it possible to transact interactive digital content.

Emphasis is now being laid on developing interactive multimedia and online learning, and adding value to the traditional distance education delivery mode with modern technology-enabled education within the framework of integrated distance and online learning.

Over the years, IGNOU has lived up to the country's expectations of providing education to the marginalised sections of society. Free of cost education is being provided to all jail inmates across the country. A large number of SC/ST students have been admitted to various programmes of the University, also efforts have been made to reach onto persons working in the Armed and Security Forces of the Country.

The main objective of the programme is to impart skills using social science knowledge and tools to understand current issues and concerns related to global movement of people, products and ideas and hence helping various stakeholders including the policy makers. The programme is important for professionals working in Government, Foreign Trade, UN organisations, Embassies and External Ministries, Migrant and diaspora organisations etc. The programme will help in imparting informed understanding on migration processes, role of diasporas in development, development-migration matrix, adding value to policy decision, planning and researches, various regulations related to international migration, best practices in migration and diaspora engagement, human rights issues of migrant communities etc.

Objective of the Programme: To impart skills in using social science knowledge in understanding current 'real world' issues related to global human migration, products, ideas and technologies and helping the stakeholders including policy makers, academicians, students and global agencies.

One can opt for eight-credit elective courses i.e MDIE 001: Gender and Diaspora (4 Credits) and MDIE 002: Diasporas in India (4 Credits) in lieu of project MDIP-001 (8 Credits) The project work will be of 200 marks

MDIP 001: Project Work (8 Credits) Elective

This is the last course whereby the learners of this programme will contribute to generation of course materials. In the process, each learner will be simultaneously completing her/ his diploma. A learner has the choice of adopting to any of the available (written text, audio/ video clippings, photographs and/ or their combination) formats for presenting her/ his findings after a short-term fieldwork-based experiential learning. No academic learning is complete unless accompanied with practical application of one's learning. Therefore, the purpose of the exercise in Course 6 is to apply social science knowledge and tools already learnt during the courses of this diploma programme. This will serve twofold purposes, one, that the learner will be able to make an informed and matured decision related to global movements of people, products and ideas; two, there will be learner participation in creation of course material for the second phase of course of this programme.

The basic idea of the learning is not so much as the outcome in the format of a PG Diploma but relating to the process of experiential learning through real life situations. It will help in gaining insight into the current global events that affect us directly and indirectly. Along with the course materials of five courses, there will be a project work which will be provided to each learner manually. The learner will receive mentorship in preparing the project proposal on a topic of his/her choice which is listed in the course programme, after receiving the approval of the project work from the IGNOU. The learner may also take help of mentors (IGNOU faculty located in its New Delhi campus via e-mail or face-to-face sessions) for completing the project work.

Evaluation Mechanisms of the Programme

In order to evaluate the learners' performance there will be a term-end examination as well as periodic assignments pertaining to the first five courses. Course 6 documents submitted by the learners will be evaluated by external examiner(s). All evaluation standards will be in keeping with IGNOU norms and guidelines.

Pedagogy Employed in the Programme

Self-learning course materials in multi-media formats will be a core component of the IGNOU system of education. There will be availability of the course materials through timely delivery in off-line and on-line modes. Main feature of these materials will reflect an attempt to enable the learner to grasp the subject matter through case-studies. The concepts and theoretical inputs will be explained in order to make the learner familiar with the contextual frame of reference. This will prepare learners to see through the complexities of the issues related to the subject chosen. As a special feature of this programme, the learners will generate self-learning course materials of IGNOU. Thus, this programme proposes to offer integration of learning and contributing to learning in the common process of knowledge creation.

Project

The project work will be 200 marks. Encouragement to be given on Archival work, return migration. List of options for project works are given below:

Instructional System

IGNOU's method of instruction differs radically from that of other conventional universities. Indira Gandhi National Open University has adopted a multimedia approach to instruction. The different components being: self-instructional materials, counselling sessions, both face-to-face and via teleconferencing mode, webinars etc.

Flexibility

In the tradition of Open Learning, IGNOU provides considerable flexibility in entry qualification, place, pace and duration of study to students. A Bachelor's Degree Programme (i.e. BA/BCom/BSc) of three years duration can be completed in six years if the student so desires.

Credit System

IGNOU follows a credit system that is based on the time factor involved in studying. One credit is equivalent to 30 study hours inclusive of all learning activities. Different programmes have different credit requirements. Students have the right to collect credits at their own pace, convenience and according to their own capability. IGNOU also provides a credit transfer facility whereby credits may be transferred from any other University to IGNOU after fulfilling the necessary requirements.
