

Shri D. Deb, Assistant Registrar was present to assist the Chairman.

At the outset the Chairman welcomed the members and introduced the new members, namely Prof. Sabyasachi Bhattacharya, Dr. S.K. Singh, Dr. R. Satyanarayana and Dr. Darvesh Gopal.

The following items were taken up:

- Item No. 1: To consider and approve the minutes of the Second meeting of the School Board held on 21.3 #1990.
- SOSS 3.1.1. The Board confirmed the minutes of the 2nd meeting of the School Board of the School of Social Sciences with the following modifications:-
 - 1) Refer Resolutions SOSS 2.3.4

 Delete 'EECG-03' after 'EECS-03'
 - ii) Refer Resolutions SOSS 2.5.1

 The entire last para is shifted and placed at the end of Resolution 2.6.2
 - iii) Refer Resolutions SOSS 2.7.1
 Incorporate the words 'in the School'
 after the word 'units' and before the
 word 'as' in the 4th line on page 6
 - iv) Refer Resolution SOSS 2.9.1

 The Board reconstituted the Sub Committee to look into the different aspects of the draft ordinances on M.Phil/Ph.D. programmes. While Prof. D.N. Dhanagare's name was taken from the external members, it was decided to have seniormost faculty members from all the disciplines in the School from inside. Thus the reconstituted sub-committee now comprises the following members:
 - 1. Prof. Pandav Nayak (Convenor).
 - 2. Prof. A.K. Bagchi
 - 3. Prof. R.S. Morkhandikar
 - 4. Prof. D.N. Dhanagare
 - 5. Prof. S.P. Verma
 - 6. Prof. B. Chattopadhyay
 - 7. Dr. Kapil Kumar
 - 8. Dr. (Mrs.) Shobita Jain
 - 9. Dr. R. Satyanarayana

With reference to the above, the Chairman tabled two papers by Prof. A.K. Bagchi and Prof. B. Chattopadhyay which, it was decided, are to be given to the Sub-committee for its examination and use.

It was further decided that the Sub-committee will submit its recommendations to the Chairman who will discuss the same with the Vice-Chancellor before reporting to the Board.

- Item No. 2 : To consider and approve introduction of two
 new courses in Public Admn.
- The Board suggested that the recommendations of the faculty of Public Administration for adding two more courses, namely Administrative Law and Administration of Public Enterprises in addition to the presently planned six courses, can be brought to the Board for its consideration after the approval of the Expert Committee.
- Item No. 3 : To consider and approve Elective Course 3
 in Sociology.
- SOSS 3.3.1 The Board considered the Elective Course-3 in Sociology and approved Blocks I to IV as per annexure I subject to the following observations:

The Course 3 in all its 8 blocks appears to be heavy content-wise for the level of the target groups who comprise a sizeable section of students coming from non 10+2 stream. It will, therefore, be advisable to proceed ahead with the first 4 Blocks while the rest of the course needs to be revised and recast. The following three guidelines may be kept in mind while revising and recasting the syllabus ESO-03:

- Without disturbing the existing topics in the Blocks 1-4, some details, if necessary, may be added to explicate the subject matter better.
- 2) A Block on Indian Sociological Thought/ Thinkers may be incorporated to have a balanced and rounded perspective on Sociological Thought for the Indian students.
- 3) If found necessary, a separate Elective may be created to cover contemporary Sociological Thinkers and Themes.

The Board has appointed one of its members, Prof. D.N. Dhanagare as a member of the recently constituted Expert Committee for Sociology. He has been requested to kindly bring to bear on the proceedings of the Expert Committee the views of the Board while discussing ESO-03 for necessary modifications.

The Board felt that a small paragraph annotating each topic in the Block may kindly be provided to facilitate deliberations in the meeting.

- The Board approved the syllabus for the courses on History of China and Japan (1:40-1949), History of Europe (1789-1939) and History of India fro 16th to Mid-18th Century.

On a general point arising out of the related discussion, the members suggested that the faculty can moot/initiate any new syllabus but the same has to be approved by the Expert Committee before it is brought to the Board.

It was suggested that the Chairman will nominate two additional members on the Expert Committee for History to consider the proposal of the courses proposed by the discipline of History before bringing it to the Board.

The Board requested the Faculty of History in consulatation with Prof. S. Bhattacharya to suggest two such names and submit to the Chairman for nomination to the Expert Committee for History. The latter will consider the rest of the Course as proposed by the Discipline of History as contained in Annexure III before they are brought to the Board for final approval.

- - i) To raise the number of counselling sessions (for a course of 8 credits) to atleast 25 instead of the present 10-12;
 - ii) Advisability of conducting of refresher courses for the counsellors in EEC-01.
- SOSS 3.5.1 The Board was of the opinion that to raise the number of counselling sessions (for a course of 8 credits) to atleast 25 instead of the present

10-12 requires greater examination in view of the factors like infrastructural facilities available at Study Centres, budgetary provisions and the very philosophy of Distance Education System. The members agreed in principle that there is a need to review the allocational ratio between the self-study hours and contact hours for every discipline. The Board, however, agreed that in view of the two extra credits in EEC-01, counselling sessions may be increased to 15-16 for the elective.

- SOSS 3.5.2 The Board approved the proposal of conducting refresher courses for the counsellors in EEC-01.
- Item_No.6 : To consider and approve the panel of experts for the course entitled 'Computer Applications in Library Science and Information Management' in pursuance of the 2nd School Board Resolution 2.3.7.
- The Board approved the list of experts who will constitute the Expert Committee to recommend appropriate action in the matter leading to the launching of the Certificate course entitled 'Computer Applications in Library Science & Information Management (Annexure IV).'

The Board decided to have Prof. S.S. Murthy as the Chairman (Dr. A. Lahiri will be the Chairman in case Prof. Murthy is not available).

The Board suggested that the Librarian, IGNOU will be an ex-officio member on the Committee.

Ms. Uma Kanjilal has been co-opted as the internal faculty member in the Expert Committee.




