Dr. Vandana Varma, Assistant Director, ACD was present to assist the Member Secretary.

Dr. Dev Kant Rao, Director, Academic Coordination Division and the Member Secretary of the Academic Council greeted all the members and informed that since last Academic Council on 18<sup>th</sup> October 2019, there has been one meeting of the Academic Council's Standing Committee on 17<sup>th</sup> July 2020 that had considered various academic matters. He then requested the Vice Chancellor and Chairperson of the Academic Council for his opening remarks and progress made by University since last Academic Council meeting.

At the outset, the Vice Chancellor and Chairperson of the Academic Council informed about the unexpected, sudden (today morning) and sad demise of Regional Director, Port Blair, Dr. S. Ganesan due to a heart attack and the Council mourn his death by keeping silence for two minutes. The Chairperson then welcomed all the members of the Academic Council including the Special Invitees for 74<sup>th</sup> Academic Council. He expressed his sincere gratitude to the members specially external members, Prof. Sudha Rao, Prof. Ramesh Chandra, Prof. J B Nadda, Prof. A K Sinha, Prof. A C Pandey, Prof. Saket Kushwaha, Shri A K Garg, Prof. B P Khandelwal, and Prof. P K Sharma, who have spared their valuable time during the Covid-19 Pandemic and were present for the meeting. The Vice Chancellor then expressed his gratitude to the outgoing members of the Council, namely, Prof. Ravindra Ramchandra Kanhere, Pro-VC (since retired); Prof. Poornima Mittal, former Director, SOS (since retired); Prof. Neera Singh, former Director, SOH; Prof. Jagdish Sharma, former Director, SOTST; Prof. R. P. Pandey, SOTST; Dr. Amiteshwar Ratra, STRIDE and late Dr. Anil Shukla, former Registrar, SED for their valuable contributions in the proceedings of the Academic Council.

The Chairperson of the Council further welcomed the newly nominated members viz., Prof. Malati Mathur, Director, SOH; Prof. Sujatha Varma, Director, SOS; Prof. R. P. Pandey, Director, SOTST; Prof. P.V.K. Sasidhar, SOEDS; Dr. Mita Sinhamahapatra, Associate Professor, SOA; Dr. Saumya, Assistant Professor, SOSW and Dr. V. B. Negi, Registrar, SED.

He then felt that since the meeting has been organized through virtual mode, it might have added some anxiety/difficulties to all the members. However, he assured that like previous meetings efforts have been made for the meeting to be as detailed and interactive as on earlier occasions. Detailing the progress made by University, the Vice Chancellor narrated a few major developments since the last meeting of Academic Council held in October, 2019 as below:

1. The 33<sup>rd</sup> Convocation of the University was successfully conducted on 17.02.2020 at headquarters in New Delhi and 39 Regional Centres across the country. **Hon'ble Minister of Human Resource and Development, Shri Ramesh Pokriyal 'Nishank', was the Chief Guest at the Convocation at Headquarters. One Governor of the State and One State Minister were also the Chief Guests at two Regional Centres.** Overall more than 2 lakh degrees were awarded to the successful students during the convocation. The Curtain Raiser was adored in all Regional Languages and the speech of the Chief Guest was also published in all the regional languages.

2. The University has launched **CBCS based Nine Undergraduate Honours programmes w.e.f. January 2020 academic session**. Further, the programme on Master of Arts in Journalism and BBA (Services) with Maharashtra Knowledge Corporation Limited (MKCL) were also launched from January 2020 session. During this period, Course development work has been progressing fast in almost all the Schools. From July 2020 session, the University has also launched the **Master of Arts in Sanskrit programme**. All the Schools and their faculty were complimented for their sincere and untiring efforts.
3. **On 17<sup>th</sup> March 2017, University was exempted by the University Grants Commission (UGC) from UGC (Online Course or Programmes) Regulations, 2018**. The Gazette Notification for the same was published on 17<sup>th</sup> January, 2020. In addition to the launch of three Online Programmes permitted by UGC in January 2020, the University has also launched twelve more Online Programmes from July 2020 session. **The programmes on Master of Arts in Hindi, Master of Arts in Gandhian Studies, Certificate in Library and Information Technology, Certificate in Information Technology and Bachelor of Arts in Tourism were also launched by the Hon'ble HRM on 1<sup>st</sup> June 2020**. In this regard, the Centre for Online Education has done a commendable job. Director, COE, Prof. Uma Kanjilal and her whole team deserved special compliments.
4. The University has been the National Coordinator for Swayam Courses with respect to Diploma and Certificate Programmes since 2016. **Forty Six new Swayam courses were launched from June 2020. There was commendable efforts and enthusiasm of the faculty during the Pandemic for launching Swayam Courses on Swayam Platform**. The response of the Learners was encouraging and around Twenty Nine Thousand Learners were enrolled as on date. The University had Twenty One Courses launched earlier where registration was more than Thirty Three thousand as on date. Concerned faculty were complimented for their initiatives in this regard. Translation work in Eight languages for Sixteen Swayam Courses was also started and this work was likely to be completed by the middle of August 2020 for which the Regional Centres have been making concerted efforts. Director, COE, Prof. Uma Kanjilal and her whole team have done a commendable job in this sphere also.
5. Formal sanction letter of HEFA loan of Rupees Seventy Five Crore was received on 23<sup>rd</sup> June 2020. The University is going for an **Memorandum of Understanding with the Central Public Works Department (CPWD) for the construction of Four Regional Centres located at Pune, Rajkot, Portblair and Trivandrum. Director General, CPWD will be present in signing ceremony**.
6. The University has also **completed the DVV validation process** with reference to the Self Assessment Report submitted in March 2020 to NAAC. During this Covid-19 Pandemic, Prof. Manjulika Srivastava, Director-CIQA and her whole team took great pains in undertaking this work.

7. The University has also started the Admission Process of July 2020, during this adverse pandemic environment. **2,15,130 students have re-registered themselves. The Fresh Registration was around 47,000.** Registrar (SRD), Dr. V. P. Rupam and all Regional Directors of all Regional Centres and their whole team were appreciated for their efforts.
8. The University has **extensively used GyanDarshan, GyanVani and Four SwayamPrabha Channels for telecasting programmes during the Covid-19. Facebook interactions with learners have gained popularity. Since 1<sup>st</sup> April 2020, 215 Facebook sessions have reached to Thirty Six Lakh learners** with cumulative views of around Eight Lakhs. Similarly, regular online counseling sessions were organized by all Regional Centres during this period. The Academic Council appreciates the efforts made by all the staff involved in these programmes. Director (EMPC) and PIU were specially complimented.
9. During August 2019 to June 2020, National Centre for Innovations in Distance Education (NCIDE) has submitted Twenty Five innovative activities to MHRD Innovation Cell (MIC) portal. Nineteen Activities of the Division have been showcased in their portal. The entire division was complemented for this achievement.
10. Shri AK Garg, Director, DMRC and Member of the Academic Council was thanked and appreciated for his efforts towards **connecting the University through the Delhi Metro.**

All the University Faculty, Academics and Other Staff are actively involved in strengthening the Learner Support Services. The Vice Chancellor and Chairperson of the Academic Council complimented all of them for their sincere efforts. Dr. Dev Kant Rao and Dr. Vandana Varma along with their whole team were appreciated for their arrangements and conduct of Academic Council meeting during this pandemic.

The Chairperson then asked the Member Secretary to make a presentation on the activities undertaken by the University during the COVID-19 lockdown period and transact the business.

Dr Dev Kant Rao, Member Secretary of the Council made a presentation of the initiatives taken by the University since lockdown on 23<sup>rd</sup> March 2020. The extracts of the Presentation are placed as **Annexure 74.1.**

All the members, especially external Members of the Academic Council, congratulated and praised the University and all the teaching and academic fraternity for such commendable work and for converting challenges into opportunities in teaching learning process. The members appreciated the performance of the University during such unprecedented time due to COVID 19 and its weekly reporting to HRD Ministry which itself was a mammoth and voluminous job. It reflected the vibrancy of the system as IGNOU had rigorously utilized all the media options for delivering the quality student support services that brought IGNOU in the line of World Class University. The Academic Council put on record its appreciation for the presentation made by Dr Dev Kant Rao, the Director, Academic and Member Secretary of the Council.

The Minutes were circulated to all the members for their comments/observations. The comments have been received from the Director, School of Computer and Information Sciences on Item No. AC 73.20.2, and the Director School of Health Sciences on Item No. AC 73.5 and 73.28.

The minimum and maximum duration mentioned in the submitted agenda were 1 and 4 years, respectively as per guidelines of the University. However, the minutes indicated the level of the Programme as Certificate.</p> <p>Hence, necessary updates may please be made to AC 73.20.2 of the minutes of 73<sup>rd</sup> Meeting of Academic Council.</p> </li> <li>2. AC 74.2.1	The Member Secretary informed that the 52 <sup>nd</sup> Meeting of the Academic Council's Standing Committee (ACSC) was held on 17 <sup>th</sup> July 2020 through digital means by using Zoom platform and the Minutes were circulated to all the members for their comments/observations on 17 <sup>th</sup> July 2020. No comments have been received from the members of the Academic Council's Standing Committee. However, the comments have been received from the Director, School of Law on Item No. ACSC 52.10.2 and the Director, School of Performing and Visual Arts on Item No. ACSC 52.7. <b>ITEM NO. 3</b>	<b>To Note the UGC Gazette Notification dated 17<sup>th</sup> January 2020 providing exemption to IGNOU from University Grants Commission (Online Courses or Programmes) Regulations, 2018 – ACD</b>



AC 74.3.1	<p>The Member Secretary informed the Council that the University Grants Commission vide its notification dated July 04, 2018 had notified the University Grants Commission (Online Courses or Programmes) Regulations, 2018. These Regulations lay down the Minimum Standards of Instruction for the grant of Certificate or Diploma or Degree, through online mode, delivered through interactive technology using internet. The Board of Management of the University at its 131<sup>st</sup> meeting held on 22<sup>nd</sup> December 2018 and the Academic Council of the University at its 72<sup>nd</sup> meeting held on 22<sup>nd</sup> January 2019 had approved the adoption of the University Grants Commission (Online Courses or Programmes) Regulations, 2018. The Board had also approved the establishment of a Centre for Online Education in this regard.</p> <p>Meanwhile, the University Grants Commission vide Gazette notification F. No. 2-5/2019 (OL), dated 17<sup>th</sup> January 2020, had made the following amendments to the University Grants Commission (Online Courses or Programmes) Regulations, 2018 in regulation 2, in sub-regulation (2):</p> <p>The following proviso was inserted :</p> <p><i>"Provided that the University Grants Commission may, by order, exempt the Indira Gandhi National Open University, a University established under the Indira Gandhi National Open University Act, 1985 (50 of 1985), from the application of these regulations, considering the objectives of the said Act".</i></p> <p>Pursuant to above Gazette Notification, the University Grants Commission vide their Order F. No. 2-5/2019 (OL), dated 17<sup>th</sup> March 2020 exempted the Indira Gandhi National Open University from the application of the University Grants Commission (Online Courses or Programmes) Regulations, 2018 with effect from the date of Gazette Notification of UGC (Online Courses or Programmes) Amendment Regulations 2020 i.e. 17<sup>th</sup> January 2020 till further Orders.</p>
AC 74.3.2	<p>The Member Secretary, further, informed that the Board of Management at its 139<sup>th</sup> meeting held on 17<sup>th</sup> March 2020 noted the UGC Gazette Notification dated 17<sup>th</sup> January 2020 and Commission Order dated 17<sup>th</sup> March 2020 exempting IGNOU from the University Grants Commission (Online Courses or Programmes) Regulations, 2018.</p> <p>The Chairperson informed that pursuant to the above exemption, the University had launched 12 Online programmes through Online mode.</p>

<b>ITEM NO. 4</b>	<b>To Consider and Approve the Action Taken by the University to launch various programmes through Online mode- COE</b>
AC 74.4.1	<p>The Member Secretary informed that the Academic Council's Standing Committee in its meeting held on 27<sup>th</sup> March, 2019 had approved proposals of 11 Programmes of Centre for Online Education (COE) for offering these programmes through online mode. Subsequently, with the approval of UGC, the University had launched three (03) programmes viz. Certificate in Arabic Language (CAL), Certificate in Russian Language (CRUL) and Certificate in Tourism Studies (CTS) to be offered through online mode from January 01, 2020. The total enrolment of the online programmes for January 2020 batch was 470.</p> <p>Meanwhile, as informed vide Item 3 of the Agenda, the University Grants Commission vide Gazette notification dated 17<sup>th</sup> January 2020 vide F.No. F. No. 2-5/2019 (OL), amended the University Grants Commission (Online Courses or Programmes) Regulations, 2018 in Regulation 2, in sub-regulation (2) and exempted the Indira Gandhi National Open University.</p> <p>In addition to above, Five more programmes were launched by the Hon'ble Minister of Human Resource Development: M.A. Hindi; MA in Gandhi and Peace Studies; BA in Tourism Studies; Certificate in Information Technology; and Certificate programme in Library and Information Science through IGNOU Facebook on 20<sup>th</sup> May 2020. The University, subsequently launched another 7 online programmes: MA in Translation Studies; Diploma in Tourism Studies; Post Graduate Diploma in Gandhi and Peace Studies; Post Graduate Certificate in Gandhi and Peace Studies; Post Graduate Certificate in Agriculture Policy; Certificate Programme in Peace Studies and Conflict Management; and Certificate in Tribal Studies with the approval of the Vice Chancellor. AC 74.5.1	<p>The Member Secretary informed that IGNOU had been identified as one of the National Coordinators for Diploma and Certificate level course for the SWAYAM initiative of MHRD, Government of India vide order dated 09<sup>th</sup> March, 2016 and the guidelines for SWAYAM issued by MHRD dated 11<sup>th</sup> March, 2016 were adopted in the 65<sup>th</sup> Academic Council Meeting held on 21<sup>st</sup> March, 2016 for development and implementation of courses.</p> <p>In the last registration cycle January 2020, 21 courses were hosted on the SWAYAM Portal of which, 3 courses were from the State Open Universities (UOU, NSOU and YCMOU). Six courses were part of the IGNOU online Programmes, namely, Certificate in Tourism Studies; Certificate in Russian</p>

	<p>Language; and Certificate in Arabic language. Total registration on SWAYAM Portal for 21 courses including courses of IGNOU Online Programmes was 43,759.</p> <p>The Council was further informed that the courses offered in the January 2020 are in the process of translation into 8 languages: Hindi, Tamil, Telegu, Kannada, Malayalam, Bengali, Gujarati and Marathi. AC 74.6.1	<p>The Member Secretary informed that the Post Graduate Diploma in Environmental and Occupational Health (PGDEOH) programme was launched in January, 2019 session and was running as on date. The admission criteria for PGDEOH, presently was 10+2 (Science) and graduation from any discipline. However, in order to attract wider student community and increase the enrollment and also introduction of compulsory environmental science paper in all programmes in the CBCS system, the faculty of Environmental studies, SOITS discussed the matter with Experts and proposed to modify the eligibility criteria for admission to 'Graduation in any discipline' by removing the '10+2 (Science)' criteria and also to include '10+Diploma in Engineering and other related courses plus Bachelor's degree from any discipline', as many applications could be received from prospective learners with such qualifications.</p> <p>The Council was further informed that the Academic Council's Standing Committee discussed the proposal of SOITS for the change in admission criteria for Post Graduate Diploma in Environmental and Occupational Health (PGDEOH) at length at its 52<sup>nd</sup> meeting held on 17<sup>th</sup> July 2020 and recommended to refer it to Academic Council for consideration.</p>
AC 74.6.2	<p>The matter was discussed in detail. Accordingly, the School Board of School of Computer and Information Sciences (SOCIS) had considered and recommended the changes in the duration of MCA Programme from 3 years to 2 years from July 2020 session onwards along with the change in the eligibility</p>

	<p>qualifications as per the Notification of AICTE in its 51<sup>st</sup> Meeting held on July 13, 2020.</p> <p>The Council was further informed that the above mentioned AICTE notification dated 3<sup>rd</sup> July 2020 was noted by the Academic Council's Standing Committee in its 52<sup>nd</sup> Meeting held on 17<sup>th</sup> July, 2020 vide ACSC 52.32.2 and ACSC had also approved the proposal of the School for the change in duration of MCA Programme from 3 years to 2 years, however, since the direction has come recently, the ACSC recommended that the change in duration would be effective for the MCA programme w.e.f January 2021 admission cycle onwards instead of July 2020 session.</p>

AC 74.8.1	<p>The Member Secretary informed that the School of Computer and Information Sciences (SOCIS) had submitted a proposal to offer a One Year Modular Diploma in Mobile Application Development (DMAD) with a provision to award Certificate in Mobile Application Development (CMAD) after successful completion of First semester. However, the Academic Council in its 73<sup>rd</sup> Meeting referred the proposal back to School Board for reconsideration after making some observations. The School had submitted the following responses to the observations of the Academic Council:</p> <p>Observation 1 : Since the Programme involved a number of Countries, it may be required to seek clearance from Ministry of External Affairs before proceeding further</p> <p>Response: (1) Since the content of DMAD was developed in collaboration with COL, SOCIS sought inputs from COL on the above mentioned observation. The response of COL are as under:</p> <p>'All the learning materials developed with COL support are available as open educational resources with CC BY-SA license, which allows anyone to reuse, revise, remix, adapt/adopt, and redistribute derivative works with</p>



attribution to the original without any permission of the copyright holder.

All the courses developed as part of DMAD are Open Education Resources (OERs) and are CC-BY-SA. Hence, the content can be shared in any medium or format. Also, the content can be adapted (ie. Remixed, transformed and build upon the material for any purpose, even commercially). Only appropriate attribution needs to be given and shared alike. Hence, no permission needs to be obtained from anywhere.'

SOCIS did not come across any such notification, wherein, it was mentioned that clearance from Ministry of External Affairs needs to be taken for the offering of a programme which includes some OER based courses developed by Open Universities outside the Country.

Observation-2 :The cost involved in Programme Development was too high

Response: 'There were a total of 8 Courses in DMAD. No cost was incurred by IGNOU for development of 5 courses. Out of the 3 remaining courses, one of the courses is Project Course which will have only Project Guidelines and will be developed by the Programme Coordinator. So, no cost needs to be incurred for development of the Project courses. Now, there are 2 courses left in the second semester of proposed DMAD programme. The expected cost to be incurred for development of 2 courses may be Rs.500000/- approx. So, the cost that may be incurred by IGNOU for development of a 32 Credit programme with 8 Courses may be Rs.500000/- approx. The cost will include expenditure incurred towards Course Writing, Content Editing and Language Editing that were part of Course development.'

School Board of SOCIS in its 51<sup>st</sup> meeting, discussed the above observations of Academic Council made in its 73rd meeting and noted the responses. School Board reconsidered and recommended Programme Development Form (PDF) and Programme Project Report (PPR) of Diploma in Mobile Application Development (DMAD) with a provision to award Certificate in Mobile Application Development (CMAD) after successful completion of first semester of DMAD for approval. School Board also felt that there is need to launch the Programme at the earliest underlining its need.

The Council was further informed that Academic Council's Standing Committee in its 52<sup>nd</sup> meeting held of 17<sup>th</sup> July 2020 discussed the proposal at length and recommended for approval of Programme Development Form (PDF) and Programme Project Report (PPR) of Diploma in Mobile Application Development (DMAD) with a provision to award Certificate in Mobile Application Development (CMAD) after successful completion of first semester of DMAD for consideration.



AC 74.8.2	The Academic Council accepted the proposal of the School as an initiative in the light of Government of India Initiative for 'Atmanirbhar Bharat'. The School was suggested that the minimum and maximum duration of the programme should uniform as per the Guidelines of the University on minimum and maximum duration of programmes/courses at different levels.
AC 74.8.3	<p>With the above observation, the Academic Council accepted the recommendations of the Academic Council's Standing Committee and approved Programme Development Form (PDF) and Programme Project Report (PPR) of Diploma in Mobile Application Development (DMAD) with a provision to award Certificate in Mobile Application Development (CMAD) after successful completion of first semester of DMAD as recommended by the Academic Council's Standing Committee. AC 74.9.1	<p>The Member Secretary informed that the School of Journalism and New Media Studies of the University has been offering MA (Journalism and Mass Communications) (MAJMC) programme. The lateral entry option for MAJMC was approved in principle by the 71<sup>st</sup> Academic Council meeting held on 22<sup>nd</sup> January 2019 by "Credit transfer to those who have completed similar courses from other recognized institutions, as per University norms".</p> <p>In order to operationalize the Academic Council's approval, the matter was placed before the 22<sup>nd</sup> School Board held on 19<sup>th</sup> February 2020. 	<p>1<sup>st</sup> year.</p> <p>The matter was placed before the Vice Chancellor and the Vice Chancellor approved that as of now “the lateral entry provision may be provided to those who have completed the 32 credit PGJMC Programme from IGNOU w.e.f July 2020 cycle”.</p> <p>The Academic Council’s Standing Committee at its 52<sup>nd</sup> meeting held on 17<sup>th</sup> July 2020 vide ACSC 52.15.2 ratified the action taken by the Vice Chancellor in approving the lateral entry provision for MAJMC programme to those who have completed the 32 credit PGJMC Programme from IGNOU w.e.f July 2020 cycle.</p>
AC 74.9.2	<p>The Academic Council approved the ratification of the decision taken by the Vice Chancellor in approving the lateral entry provision for MAJMC programme to those who have completed the 32 credit PGJMC Programme from IGNOU w.e.f July 2020 cycle. AC 74.10.1	<p>The Academic Council was informed that a Committee was constituted by the Vice Chancellor to review various provisions related to admissions to various programmes of the University consistent with various policies/ guidelines/ norms of the University. The Committee had submitted its report and the recommendations of the Committee on various issues were as under:</p> <p><b>1. Review of Provisions for Associate Studentship and Re-admission</b></p> <p>The Committee, after detailed examinations of various provisions, had recommended the following:</p> <p>a) The Associate Studentship Scheme may be withdrawn and</p>

subjected to review. The University may consider re-launching the Scheme after framing an appropriate Regulation to support it.

- b) The Scheme of Re-Admission may be withdrawn from the Prospectus with immediate effect. The existing students may be given a deadline as decided by the University to complete the remaining courses.
- c) The Scheme of Admission to Management Programmes through Form-3 (after completing the maximum validity period, without appearing in the Entrance Test) may be withdrawn with immediate effect from the Management Programs Prospectus, including the Prospectus for MBA (Banking and Finance). The existing students may be informed about withdrawal of the scheme and advised to complete their program accordingly. In case a student fails to complete the programme, s/he will be required to appear in the entrance test and join the programme afresh, seek transfer of credits in respect of successfully completed courses and complete the remaining courses as per University rules.

In this matter, the Chairperson informed that Associate Studentship is course-wise choice offered to the learners, however, since, the University does not have any Regulation for Associate Studentship, the same has been recommended to withdraw from July 2020.

## **2. Matter related to offering of Bachelor Preparatory Programme (BPP)**

The matter related to offering of BPP was deliberated upon by the Academic Council at its 72<sup>nd</sup> meeting held on 30<sup>th</sup> April 2019. As reported in the meeting, a letter seeking clarification was sent to UGC.

In response the University Grants Commission vide their communication dated 20<sup>th</sup> March 2020, conveying the following decision of the Commission taken at its 545<sup>th</sup> Meeting:

*Courses like Bachelors Preparatory Programme (BPP) shall not be offered through ODL mode by the HEIs, as "Foundation Courses" are not specified under the UGC Notification on Specification of Degrees, 2014 and no such provision exists under the UGC (ODL) Regulations, 2017 and its amendments.*

The Bachelors Preparatory Programme (BPP) has already been withdrawn from Jan 2019.

## **3. Matter related to minimum and maximum duration of**

### Programmes offered by the University

The minimum and maximum duration of programmes on offer at Postgraduate, Undergraduate, PG Diploma, Diploma and Certificate level is as under:

Level	Minimum duration	Maximum Duration
Postgraduate	2 Years	5 Years*
Undergraduate	3 Years	6 Years
PG Diploma/Diploma	1 Year	3-4 Years
Certificate	6 months	2 Years

\*For two Postgraduate Programmes – MSCMACS and MTTM, the maximum duration is 4 years.

The Undergraduate and Postgraduate Programmes are under the purview of UGC. In order to ensure parity/equivalence with the degrees awarded by other Universities, it is important that UGC norms with regard to minimum/maximum duration of Programmes are strictly adhered to. For Undergraduate Programmes, the ratio of minimum and maximum duration is 1:2.

#### 4. Matter related to the facility of Provisional Admission

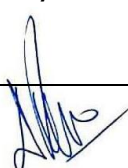
The University has a provision for Provisional Admission to the programmes (except Certificate programmes of six month duration, Awareness programmes, non-credit programmes and Merit-based/Entrance Test based programmes). Those candidates who otherwise fulfill the prescribed eligibility criteria, but are unable to apply for want of declaration of result of the qualifying examination and/or for want of final Mark-sheet and Provisional Certificate, but desirous of seeking admission in July/January) admission cycle, as the case may be, can submit the prescribed admission form with requisite fee, as per schedule. Such candidates are also required to submit an undertaking. Other terms and conditions for seeking Provisional Admission are:

- a) All the prospective students who have submitted their filled-in admission form along with the Undertaking are required to submit the consolidated Final Mark-sheet and Provisional Certificate/ Degree Certificate by 30<sup>th</sup> September (for July admission cycle) and 31<sup>st</sup> March (for January admission cycle).

	<p>b) Failure to submit the Final Mark-sheet and Provisional Certificate/Degree Certificate will attract cancellation of admission and forfeiture of 25% of fee paid.</p> <p>c) Self-learning material will be issued to all the candidates seeking 'Provisional admission' on remittance of the programme fee, as in the case of other students.</p> <p>d) Regional Directors will confirm the final admission only on fulfillment of the condition at (i) above.</p> <p>With increasing enrolment, operational difficulties are being faced in monitoring the cases of Provisional Admission. As such, it is proposed to withdraw the scheme from July 2020</p>
AC 74.10.2	The recommendations of the Committee were discussed in detail. During the discussion on the agenda it was suggested that keeping in view the UGC norms and University's own standards, the maximum duration defined above for Post Graduate Diploma and Diploma programmes of the University may be kept two (02) years in place of 3 years, as proposed.
AC 74.10.3	<p>After detailed deliberations, the Academic Council approved the recommendations of the Committee constituted to review various provisions related to admissions to various programmes of the University consistent with various policies/ guidelines/ norms of the University and approved various recommendations of the Committee as above with the observations that the maximum duration in respect of PG PROGRAMMES (4 Years), Certificate Programmes (2 years) and Diploma and Post Graduate Diploma (3 years). Regarding Associateship separate rules be framed in tune with Swayam regulations.</p> <p style="text-align: right;"><b>Action: SRD/All Schools of Studies</b></p>
<b>ITEM NO. 11</b>	<b>To consider and approve International fee of the remaining programmes for offering to FSRI students &amp; rationalization of fee of existing programmes on offer to FSRI &amp; Overseas Students – ID</b>
AC 74.11.1	The Director, International Division informed that in addition to already offered programmes, it had been decided to offer remaining programmes to Foreign Students Residing in India (FSRI) except M.Phil./Ph.D and that required calculation of international fees for those programmes. The University had very recently revised the fees of its programmes for National students. The revision of fees be classified into three categories i.e. enhancements, reduction and no change. This was taken as the base

	<p>for working out the fees for the programmes offered to students of FSRI from SAARC and Non-SAARC countries.</p> <p>The fees for all the programmes for the students had been calculated for SAARC countries in three slabs i.e. 1.8 times, 2 times and 2.5 times of the National fees. Similarly, the fee for students of non-SAARC countries had been calculated in three slabs i.e. 9 times, 10 times and 11 times of the National fees along with their conversion in US \$ shown in the brackets.</p> <p>Meanwhile, the International Division had received requests from various Overseas Study Centres terming the recent revision of fees as a very steep. They had also pointed out that the fee of similar programmes offered by other Indian Universities like Annamalai University, Jaipur National University, Bharathiar University, etc. through distance mode, was much less. Due to huge gap in the fees charged by IGNOU and other Indian Universities, students were joining the programmes of other Indian Universities. The overseas study centres in Ethiopia, Jeddah, Riyadh, Dubai, Kyrgyzstan, Kuwait, etc. had requested for reduction of fees for sustainable existence in the wake of fierce competition being faced vis-à-vis many Universities. Further, the impact of increase in fees be felt from the downfall in the fresh student enrollment for January 2020 cycle.</p> <p>In view of above situation, the International Division proposed that the fee of existing programmes on offer, required for rationalization to counter the situation being faced by IGNOU internationally and informed that the fees for international students whether from SAARC or Non-SAARC countries, thus, rationalized in order to attract student enrollment in all the programmes of the University which is as under:</p> <p>'The fees for SAARC and Non-SAARC country students have been proposed which is 1.8 times of the National fees for SAARC Countries rounded off in thousands (in case 500, then to the thousands on the higher side) and 9 times of the National fees for Non-SAARC countries rounded off in thousands (in case 500, then to the thousands on the higher side) and in US\$ rounded off to the (in case 50, then to the hundreds on the higher side).'</p> <p>The Division further mentioned that FSRI students are utilizing the same infrastructure and support system which is already in place for national students.</p>
AC 74.11.2	<p>After detailed discussion, the Academic Council approved the proposal of International Division for finalizing the International fee of the remaining programmes to be offered to FSRI students &amp; rationalization of fee of existing programmes on offer to FSRI &amp; overseas students, as under:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. The fee structure of all the programmes which were on offer in July</li> </ol>

	<p>2019 shall be the same as in July 2019 for students of SAARC and Non-SAARC countries.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>2. <p>AC 74.12.1</p>	<p>The Director, International Division informed that the University had started offering online programmes in the country and it had been decided by the University to offer 15 programmes through online mode under Centre for Online Education to international students i.e. Foreign Students Residing in India (FSRIs) and overseas students in view of demand of present time.</p> <p>In view of need for rationalization of fee for the programmes for the students for SAARC and NON-SAARC countries explained in AC 74.11.1, the International Division proposed the following fee structure for FSRIs and overseas students:</p> <p>'The fees may be half of that as decided in the AC 74.11.</p>

AC 74.15.1	<p>The Member Secretary informed that the Ministry of Human Resource Development vide F.No.9.21/2012-SC/ST dated 01/10/2013 circulated a document for implementation of SCSP and TSP. This document stated that Higher Education Institution may earmark a minimum of 15 per cent and 7.5 per cent of grants for SCSP and TSP respectively. The grants under these account heads was to be utilized through Direct Benefits Transfer Scheme to students and fee waiver was one of activities suggested for utilization of the grants.</p> <p>In view of MHRD circular, the Vice-Chancellor constituted a Committee to formulate DBT scheme for SC/ST students in the Financial Year 2015-16. On the recommendations of the Committee, as per the guidelines specified in the document and approval of the Competent Authority, the University introduced Scheme of programme fee reimbursement in Financial Year 2015-16 in selected Undergraduate programmes i.e. B.A., B.Com, B.Sc., BSW; BTS and BCA. Later on, the provision of exemption/reimbursement of programme fee was extended in other academic programmes depending on extent of utilization of grants in previous admission cycles. This Committee was re-constituted and was notified on 27<sup>th</sup> September, 2019 to bring fresh ideas/thoughts in formulating and monitoring the schemes of SCSP/TSP.</p> <p>On the recommendations of the aforementioned Committee and approval of the Vice Chancellor, the University issued notifications dated 19<sup>th</sup> May 2020 for fee exemption to SC/ST students for July 2020 admission cycle and dated 29<sup>th</sup> April 2020 for extending benefits of fee exemptions for re-registered SC/ST students for July 2020 admission cycle confined to those students who were eligible for exemption/reimbursement of fee in earlier admission cycles. However, the notification for extending benefits of fee exemptions for fresh SC/ST students for July 2020 admission cycle issued on 19<sup>th</sup> May 2020 was withdrawn to seek some more clarity on implementation issue. The revised notification for fresh students was issued for 100 Academic programmes at Undergraduate degree, Diploma and certificate for July 2020 cycle on 20<sup>th</sup> June 2020.</p> <p>The Academic Council was further informed that over the years, the number of academic programmes covered under the scheme had increased from 6 in 2015-16 to 128 in 2019-20 resulting in increase in total number of SC/ST students from about 85000 in 2015-16 to 2.25 lakhs in</p>

	<p>2019-20. Nevertheless, from the year 2015 to 2018, the University provided fee exemption to all the eligible SC/ST candidates, as there were adequate financial grant made available. However, in the year 2018-19, the University spent Rs.11.46 crore in excess of the grants received and also in the last two years, the University has been burdened with a net shortfall of Rs.53.62 crores on account of waiver of fee for SC/ST students. The University further predicted that the financial liability of the University in the next three academic years would be in the range of Rs.60-65 crores annually, if the present system of fee exemption was continued without any change.</p> <p>In this regard, the University sought guidance of the Board of Management (BOM) in its 139 meeting held on 17<sup>th</sup> March 2020 regarding surplus spending on the scheme of fee exemption; and apprehended that the University may not be able to sustain the Scheme unless adequate financial support was provided. The BOM advised to review the scheme of fee exemption to SC/ST Students, rationalize the number of courses, and to request the concerned Ministries to support the fee waiver scheme.</p> <p>The University reviewed the utilization and availability of SCSP/TSP grants as suggested by BOM and decided to withdraw the scheme of fee exemption to SC/ST students in few Academic programmes having poor strength of SC/ST students, however, the University will continue with the said scheme for those Undergraduate degree, Diploma and Certificate level Academic programmes, which were popular and intended to provide maximum eligibility qualifications for jobs.</p>

5. The students who would not be able to appear in the TEE to be held in Sept. 2020 due to Covid 19 pandemic will be given an opportunity to appear in the TEE to be held in December 2020. For this purpose, the validity period of registration of those students whose registration ended in June 2020 will be extended till December 2020.
6. The Examination Fee submitted along with the Examination Form by the students as specified in Items 4 and 5 above will be adjusted at the time of filling of the Examination Form by them for TEE, December 2020.
7. Necessary Notification containing the recommendations of the Committee will be issued and the same will be uploaded on the

AC 74.23.1	The Member Secretary informed that over the years, the increase in the number of the students had also resulted in the increase in the number of Assignments received at the University. As evident from the data provided by the Students Evaluation Division (SED), the University had received and processed 30,43,040 Assignments in the year 2015, which has increased by 6,94,602 over a period of four years and thus, stood at 37,37,642 in the year 2019. Currently, the evaluation of Assignments in the University has been pen and paper based and completely dependent upon the receipt, processing and evaluation by the Academic Counselors at the Learner Support Centres and Regional Centres, for the receipt, online entry and transmission of marks / grades to the Headquarters through online mode. The University had also experienced that timely declaration of Term-end Examination results in the mandatory period of 45 days was severely constrained due to delay in processing, evaluation and transmission of assignment marks / grades to the University. With the increased intervention of technology in the evaluation process, it had become inevitable for the University to adopt online mode of receiving, processing and evaluation of Assignments, so that the Term-end Examination results in both the sessions i.e. June and December could be declared completely along with Assignment marks / grades.

#### **Regulatory Provisions in the University:**

The Council was further apprised that the evaluation process, its methodology and related operational procedures in the University are governed by Ordinance on Conduct of Examinations and Evaluation of Student Performance (Ordinance 9 under Section 26 (1) (b) of the IGNOU Act - No.50 of 1985) which under Section 3(3) states "The assignments may be either marked by tutors / counselors and those marked by computer (multiple choice type). The instructions to candidates about the nature and type of assignments and the schedule for its submission shall be prescribed in the relevant programme guide and / or in the course itself".

In the light of the above background information and provisions in the University Ordinance on Examination, the time was appropriate for the University to shift towards online receipt, processing and evaluation of assignments.

In view of above, a Committee was constituted under the Chairpersonship of Prof RR Kanhere, the then Pro-Vice Chancellor, IGNOU to suggest action plan and implementation strategies towards bringing reforms in the academic and examination systems of the University especially with regard to the programmes having low enrollment. The recommendations of the Committee were accepted by the Academic Council at its 73<sup>rd</sup> meeting held



	<p>on 18<sup>th</sup> October 2019. With regard to Online interventions in submission and evaluation of assignments, the Committee had suggested the following:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. There was a need for developing a robust system of handling Assignments electronically. The University may go for a Question bank so that a number of assignments are generated and each student provided a separate assignment. The Assignments can be received through online mode, checked for plagiarism and then evaluated digitally. This will help in smooth and timely evaluation of assignments.</li> <li>b. In the first phase, the online submission of assignments for all such low enrolment programmes along with programmes of SOCIS (BCA/MCA/CIT) may be initiated. <p>AC 74.24.1</p>	<p>The Member Secretary informed the Council that IGNOU being National Open University is spread across the length and breadth of the Country and abroad with its 56 Regional Centres and more than 1800 Learner Support Centres, catering to more than 30 lacs learners. With a commitment to ensure well-being of more than 30 lakh learners and their families, University effectively and vibrantly used the social media including Twitter, facebook, emails, WhatsApp, Digital Resources to reach them and urge them to adhere to the Government directions and guidelines of social distancing and complete lockdown and show their determination and resolve in expressing our solidarity with the initiatives taken by the Govt. of India. More than 30 lacs learners and more than 60000 Academic Counselors of IGNOU were also requested to act as IGNOU's Ambassadors and sensitize their family, friends and society towards the need to follow Government directions, social distancing, and public health measures.</p> <p>In compliance with the Government of India directives regarding several safety measures to combat the spread of global COVID-19 pandemic including social distancing and complete lockdown, the University vide its Circular F.No. IG/HK/2020/67, dated 21<sup>st</sup> March 2020 advised its Teachers, Academics and Non-teaching staff to work from home. Accordingly, vide its Circular No. IGNOU/ACD/Misc./2020, dated 27<sup>th</sup> March, 2020, the University had requested the Teachers and Academics of the University to utilize this period for various academic activities including development of online content, online teaching and evaluation; prepare lesson plan and develop instructional material for the courses to be offered during next academic year/semester; and prepare innovative questions for Question</p>

Banks, amongst others. The Faculty members/Teachers/Academics working in various Schools/Division/Centre etc were also requested to regularly upload digital content/lesson plans/Assignments/Projects/resolve learners' queries on their respective webpage or on the University website and a report of efforts made and services provided was to be submitted to respective Pro-Vice Chancellors and Vice Chancellor regularly on weekly basis through e-mail/Whatsapp.

The Ministry of Human Resources and Development Letter D.O. No. 13-12/2020/CU-Cdn. Dated 31<sup>st</sup> March 2020 sought the measures taken by the University to continue the study programmes of the learners enrolled with it from their homes without any impediment by adopting online method of teaching-learning process. An Action Taken Report on the matter was to be submitted by the University to the Ministry in this regard every week.

Therefore, vide its Circular No. IGNOU/ACD/Misc./2020/15 , dated 1<sup>st</sup> April 2020, all the Schools of Studies and Divisions/Centre/Cells/Units of the University were requested to submit the Action Taken Report on the matter including efforts made and services provided to the learners using digital resources/online methods of teaching-learning process.

With the active participation of the Teachers, Academics and other staff of the University spread across Schools of Studies, Divisions/Centres/Institutes/Units/Cells and Regional Centres, the University had taken several measures to mitigate the situation arising out of COVID 19 pandemic. The students had been given extra period to fill up admission and examination forms. 59 courses/ programmes had been launched during the current Pandemic period including 12 Online programmes, 49 MOOCs courses on Swayam digital portal and one ODL degree programmes besides more than 100 new CBCS courses launched. The academic fraternity including Teachers and Academics at the Headquarters and Regional Centres spread across the country of the University were engaged in addressing the teaching-learning process differently and trying to reach the learners effectively using varied technology enabled means including conduct of academic counselling online using digital means; online submission and marking of assignments; development of virtual labs; using Web Enabled Academic Support system like Facebook live, WhatsApp, emails, chatgroups etc. for interacting with learners; online induction of learners; using Cloud platforms like Zoom, CISCO, Google Meet etc. for conducting online meetings with students and other colleagues. As much as 585 Unites were written, 1469 Units were edited, 302 Unites were revised and 239 courses were either developed or revised. Also about 768 courses and 2815 Blocks had been uploaded on IGNOU Mobile App and 356, 1163 and 2699 courses, blocks, and Units had been uploaded on eGyankosh, respectively during the Noval Corona Virus

Pandemic.


In addition, the academic content has also been transmitted through GyanVani and regular broadcast of academic content through GyanDarsan, GyanDhara and SwayamPrabha channels housed in state of the Art Electronic Media Production Centre (EMPC) and Centre for Online Education (COE) of the University. Lacs of Assignments were received Online and had been evaluated. Several Thousands of Online Counselling Sessions organized and Video/Audio and Digital content delivered through GyanVani, GyanDarsan and SwayamPrabha. As many as 2996 academic counseling session had been organized including recorded as well as interactive live radio sessions through GyanVani and for a total of 2856 hours, the University had broadcasted its educational programmes through Gyan Darsan channel, out of which, 234 hours were Live sessions. Total counselling sessions organized for learners at 56 Regional Centres were 33194 and that at School level were 2246 in various programmes offered by the University. On administration and establishment front, University had ensured that salaries and retirement dues were released to the Staff within time without delay and there had been absolutely no delay in this regard.

The Interaction amongst Faculty and Staff as well as of Faculty with Other Schools and Divisions had increased manifold as was evident from hundreds of Faculty and staff meetings organized during this period. As far as professional development of the faculty and academics was concerned, it may be noted that about 336 Research articles had been written on various areas, including discipline based and systemic research, by the teachers and academics at Schools of Studies, Academic Divisions and Regional centres out of which about 146 had been published in different reputed journals. Besides this, the faculty and Academics had attended hundreds of webinars on various contemporary issues organized by IGNOU and other Higher Educational Institutions. University responded to all communications received from Ministry and Statutory bodies well in time and in fact this period saw several initiatives taken by the University for improving/reviewing/consolidating the Policies and Guidelines of the University.

During this period, the University had submitted 15 Weekly Reports of each week to MHRD vide letter dated 5<sup>th</sup> April 2020; dated 15<sup>th</sup> April 2020; dated 20<sup>th</sup> April 2020; dated 27<sup>th</sup> April 2020; dated 5<sup>th</sup> May 2020; dated 13<sup>th</sup> May 2020; dated 17<sup>th</sup> May 2020; dated 25<sup>th</sup> May 2020; dated 2<sup>nd</sup> June 2020; dated 10<sup>th</sup> June 2020; dated 16<sup>th</sup> June 2020; dated 23<sup>rd</sup> June 2020; dated 28<sup>th</sup> June 2020; and dated 7<sup>th</sup> July 2020.

Director ACD has made a brief presentation for the above in the beginning and is also appended as **Annexure 74.1**.
